

Editorial






At the Bridge Table - The Importance of Timing - By Jaan

Timing is so important, not only in sports but in a huge range of other activities. It is no surprise, then, that timing can also be of vital importance in playing a bridge hand. Here is a simple example

Contract 4♠ by South,

Opening lead Q*


You can see 4 potential losers, one in each suit. If you win the first trick and start on trumps at once, East can win and play another club. It will then be too late to set up a discard for your losing club on the diamond suit in dummy. At trick 2 you need to immediately work on the diamond suit. Then you



will have the timing to discard your club loser. There are many more types of situation where timing is vital, both for declarer but also for defence.

Two hands from Hell

Here are two diabolical hands from the recent Mudgee Open Teams.



I am sitting East, in the perfectly reasonable contract

of 4♠. North has bid hearts, and the lead is Q♥. I can see 2 likely losers in clubs and 2 possible losers in diamonds. I win the lead in dummy and, since this is my only sure entry to dummy, I lead a diamond towards my King. North goes up with the Ace and returns a heart. What would you do? There are two possible problems. If I ruff low, South may be able to overruff. If I ruff high and the trumps split 3-0 I will have a trump loser. I decide, rightly or wrongly, to ruff high. South follows with another heart, so a low ruff

would have worked. And, you guessed it, the trumps are 3-0, so South now has a trump trick, and I only make 9 tricks.

I am sitting East again. South opens 4 hearts, with both vulnerable. My partner doubles. Now this has some danger, but so does passing. I think the double is certainly reasonable. North decides to redouble, and we have nowhere to

run. The contract makes with an overtrick and we get a score of -1480.
