Bridge Trivia

The most common hand shape is 4-4-3-2, which will occur, on average, about 21.5% of the time. The 'flattest' hand, 4-3-3-3, is only 5th on probabilities, and will occur about 10.5% of the time.

How often do you expect to hold a 7-card suit? The probability is about 3.5% - about once in a 30-board session.

You, as East, are in 3NT and the lead is the \mathbf{V} K. What is your plan? This is a 'Bath coup' setting, as discussed in the last newsletter. You should play small on the 1st trick. If you play the ace, and East gets the lead to return a heart, you are sunk. If you duck the first trick, South cannot continue hearts without conceding another trick and the contract.

Whatever South now chooses, you have time to safely establish 2 spade tricks, for at least 9 tricks. In the Open section everyone was in 3NT, with 5 declarers

making 10 tricks and one making 9. It is easy to make 10 tricks if South continues Hearts, but not so easy otherwise. In the Rookie section two declarers were in 3NT, with 1 making 10 tricks and the other only 6 (strange!). Another was in 2NT, making 10 tricks, and finally one was in 4 spades in a 3-3 fit (oops!).



Saturday 4th March – board #16 in the final session.

West deals and passes. North bids 1 spade. How might the bidding continue? East could double, with a strong hand, South would raise spades, and E-W are now headed for trouble. If West passes, North may well bid 4 spades, and it is now virtually impossible for E-W to find their diamond fit.

There is a useful bidding gadget here the 'unusual 2NT', which shows a distributional hand with the lowest two unbid suits. At our table, East bid 2NT after the 1 spade opening, showing a

hand with diamonds and clubs. It could be weak or strong. Purists may say that it should be at least 5-5 in the suits, but in the real world a small lie is sometimes the best. South then bid 2 spades, pass from West, 4 spades from North. East bid 5 clubs, doubled by South. West then chose the other suit, 5 diamonds, which was doubled (?) by North. Declarer made 12 tricks for +950.

Getting the Most from Your Bridge Baron

There are many versions of Bridge Baron out there. To get the most from your software you need to make it suit you. Most people tire of the bidding quickly and just want to practise playing the hands. Defending can also be painful and so often the computer plays so quickly you have difficulty following what's happening. No matter what version of Bridge Baron you have it will work in a similar way. Make the suggested changes and life will get a whole lot easier. Remember, each version looks a little different but the principles are the same.

Open your Bridge Baron and find the Menu Bar across the top of the game.



Now we want to set up the game so you are the declarer all the time.



Taking these steps will ensure you are always declarer ⁽²⁾ and therefore will be playing all the hands.

Now we want to slow the game so you can see what's happening.

5. Now click on Game
