

Tip: Never be concerned about a weak doubleton, if you have a balanced hand and the right strength always open 1NT.

At the Bridge Table (J.O.)


I found the following two interesting hands from our recent congress.



The first hand is from the Pairs. It is board 25 from Match 6.

As you can see, N-S can make 6D or 6H, but only 5 pairs found either. The bidding will not be straight forward, as there is bound to be interference. Most Norths will open 1H but 1NT is also an option. Over 1H, East will likely bid 2H, Michaels, showing a distributional hand with spades and an unknown minor. South might support hearts immediately, but most will surely show their good 7-card diamond suit. West will then know that partner has spades and clubs, and may raise the ante to 5 clubs. North should then show good diamond support and South, with a singleton club, ought then to bid 6D.

The second hand comes from the Teams event, board 3 in match 4.



I was sitting East and picked up this nice hand. After three passes I opted for a strong 2C opening, in view of the great shape and controls. Some will choose to open 1D with this hand. Partner responded 2NT which, in our agreement, shows 5-8 points, or thereabouts, with no suit worth bidding. I then showed my diamond suit which was raised by partner. While 6D looks a bit risky, I could imagine quite a few possible for partner which would give a good play for slam, so I bid 6 diamonds. The play was straightforward. Only two others found the slam. Most were in 3NT, making anywhere from 7 to 12 tricks.

Needless to say, others may have different views about how to best bid these hands. Let us know and

we might have an interesting discussion.

From the Directors Desk

- Players are encouraged to make a claim as soon as you know you have the rest of the tricks. This should become a habit with players. Do it thoughtfully and carefully.
- Once a claim is made play ceases and if all players agree the board may now be scored. If the claim is disputed, by any player (dummy included), the director must be called immediately. However, if all 4 players take action themselves and "play out the hand" the result will stand and players lose all recourse to the Director.

Player Promotions

Last month eight of our members moved up the bridge ranking scale. Congratulations players.


