At the Bridge Table by Jaan

This month I am presenting two interesting problems, one on bidding and one on declarer play.

Bidding

South

This is a hand that occurred in the club on Wednesday 3rd April. West dealt and East-West passed throughout. Only the North-South hands are shown.

How would you and your partner bid this hand, starting with North?

Playing a basic standard system, I think North is best to open a strong artificial 2 clubs, although 2NT is OK if you

play 20-22. South's response depends on system details. Many play 2 diamonds here as a waiting bid, others might bid 2 hearts as a 'positive' response with a good suit. South clearly sees enough combined strength for a slam and should not stop below slam level. In my view North should now bid 3 clubs, showing at least a good 5-card suit. South can check on key-cards and, finding 3, bid a confident 7 clubs. Even if North decides to bid 2NT at their 2nd turn, the club fit and grand slam can still be found, although not so easily. 6NT is a reasonable contract, although should only make 12 tricks.

This is a neat declarer play problem that I came across, watching a YouTube video presented by Gavin Wolpert, a top American player and teacher. Again, only the North-South hands are shown.

South opens 1D and West overcall 2D, showing at least 5-5 in the major suits. You finish up in 5 clubs, and West leads a small diamond. You win in dummy with the Q, and pause to think. It looks very much like a singleton lead, so there is the danger of a ruff coming. You lead the

but, alas, East plays the Ace and returns the diamond Jack. This is the crucial moment. If you reflexively cover the Jack, as many might, you have lost your contract. West will ruff and you still have an unavoidable spade loser. You need to duck the Jack. Dummy can take care of any further diamond leads, and you will preserve your A,K of diamonds on which you can later discard dummy's two spade losers.

When presented as a problem it may not be too hard to find the right play. Would you find it at the table?
