Covering the bidding slip is not something we normally do at our club. However, according to the rules after the 3rd player has played to a trick the bidding slip should be covered. If, after this time, a player uncovers the bidding slip the Director can impose a penalty. Mathew McManus suggests Directors explain the rule and only penalise players who repeatedly make the infringement.

The Woof Team (Graham Woof, Caroline Nicholls, Kevin Hughes, John Drew) finished as the top Novice team.

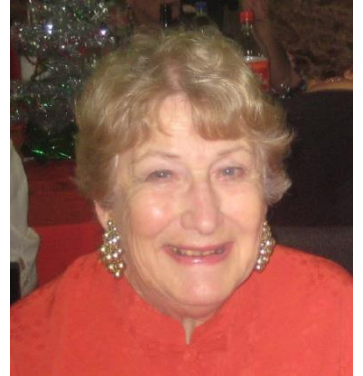

## At the Bridge Table - Slams a plenty - By Jaan

It has been calculated that around 13% of boards allow the possibility of a slam. Given that some of these are not biddable realistically, and some can only be made via an anti-percentage play, a reasonable rule of thumb might be that a slam might be bid and made on perhaps 5% of boards, about 1 in 20. So it was very unusual that, in match 5 of our recent Congress pairs event, the hand records show that one or more slams can be made on 6 of the nine boards. Here are 4 of the realistic ones.

Here N/S can make a grand in hearts or NT. Provided West doesn't get frisky and open 3 clubs, North will open 1-spade and South can key-card to find no aces missing, and should bid to at least 6-hearts. Nobody found the grand slam. The small slam was only bid by 9 of 16 pairs in the open and 2 of 12 pairs in the restricted/novice.

This hand is not quite as easy to bid, and nobody found even a small slam, although a grand is possible in either minor, although not a good contract to be in. Readers can puzzle over a good bidding sequence.

There are 34 hcp between the hands, and 6NT should be reached by most pairs. It is not so easy to bid to the grand, as neither hand has a long solid suit. East will pass in 1st seat and South will most likely open 1-diamond. North will bid a natural 1-spade and South might then bid 2NT, showing some 17-19 points, or reverse into hearts. In either case North should find 6NT. 11 open pairs and 4 restricted/novice found the slam. Seven is a poor contract, but one pair bid and made 7-diamonds.
