

Audrey Grant is a Canadian contract bridge teacher and writer. Audrey is known for her powerful bridge teaching methods and



quality instruction books. She is global personality in our bridge world.

Improve Your Declarer Play – the book focuses on developing the endplay technique to improve your game. So what is an endplay? It's the technique of losing a trick to an opponent forcing her to return a favourable lead back to you. It typically occurs near the end of a deal.

In the book you are taken through 5 steps so that when you play your exit card the defender has no winning options. In poker they would say you hold all the aces. The book contains bidding suggestions, card play tips and of course, a ton of practice deals to cement each of the 5 steps.

When I finish with the book I'll pop it back in the library for you to borrow. In the mean time we have a range of other Audrey Grant books just waiting for you. As always you can check with club librarian, Karen Ody, and she will point you in the direction of a book suitable for your level of experience.

At the Bridge Table – How to avoid finesses:

Endplays - By Jaan

We all know how to finesse. With no other clues we expect this to work around 50% of the time. Can we do better, without peeking? Yes, sometimes, if the hands are suitable, there can be a 100% play.

Consider these North-South hands. You are South, in a contract of 4 hearts, and the opening lead is the club Ace, followed by the King, and a 3rd club, which you ruff. You then draw trumps, which split 3 -1. You have lost 2 tricks in clubs, and there is an unavoidable diamond loser. If you can guess the spade position, you can finesse and avoid a spade loser, making your game. **But** the finesse can be taken either way – how good are you at guessing?

This contract is 100% secure! All you need to do is to play off the A,K of diamonds and then your final small diamond. Whichever opponent wins, they will be 'end played'. They can either play a spade, giving you a 'free finesse' or give

you a ruff and discard, allowing you to dispose of your potential spade loser. Neat, isn't it!

Another name for this type of play is 'strip and throw in', which describes the process well. You strip the two hands of cards which would allow the defenders a safe exit, and then throw the lead to one of the opponents, forcing them to concede a trick to you. Endplays are generally considered to be an 'advanced' topic, and some can be quite difficult to foresee and execute. But the idea is simple - if you have the right hands and know to look out for endplay positions. Audrey Grant has written a great book for beginners, which is in the BWBC Library.
