### At the Bridge Table — By Jaan

Have you ever been squeezed by your partner? I don't mean as a gesture of affection - rather the opposite.

First, consider this defender problem, when each player has 3 cards left. Let's suppose South needs 2 more tricks to make game, and West is on lead. If West leads the heart T, East is squeezed and forced to discard a card they cannot afford.

Whichever choice they make, South will make 2 of the remaining tricks – work it out. This is known, technically, as a 'Suicide Squeeze'. On the other hand, if West leads a spade, East will make 2 tricks.

How is West to know? Even experts might misread this position. The lesson is - be careful of cashing winners when there are few cards left, as partner may well be put under pressure.

Here is a full hand, taken from an on-line article by David Bird and Martin Hoffman, based on an actual deal.

South opens 2NT and is raised, somewhat optimistically to 3NT. West leads the diamond 2. How would you play this, as declarer? It would be reasonable to duck the first trick, and win the diamond continuation. Then cash the A,K of spades and give up a spade, won by West. West leads another diamond to your remaining honour. You then cash your established spade, winning in dummy, and lead a club to the 9 and Q. At this stage declarer has 5 tricks and defenders 3. The following cards remain, with West on lead. West, having worked hard to establish the long diamond, decides to cash it. East can wriggle or glare as much as they like, but it won't help a bit. Any other lead by West should hold declarer to 8 tricks.

## Quarterly Point Score - By Peter

In lieu of the monthly point score, in 2025 the club will run **Quarterly Point Score** competitions, an opportunity for pairs to earn additional green masterpoints as a reward for their **regular** attendance.

#### How will it work?

It will apply to every playing day of the week and will score results for pairs who attend a minimum number\*\* of sessions on a given day in the quarter.

\*\* See the table below

Here as an example: Mondays in the first quarter (Jan - Mar) of 2025

There are 13 Mondays in Q1 (Jan - Mar).

Excluding special events (Australia Day Pairs, Swiss Pairs, Upside Down Pairs) there are 9 regular session Mondays which count towards the quarterly point score.

For Q1 Mondays, a pair attending 5 or more sessions is competing. If playing at more than 5 sessions, their best 5 Monday results are taken.
