
Beginners Lessons

◆ Canberra Summer Festival of Bridge (7th – 19th January)


This is one of Australia's premier bridge congresses, with around 1000 players, in many different events at both open and restricted/novice levels. Participation by our club members was less than in years past, but a few who did travel to Canberra came back with some gold points. Particularly notable achievements were

The Coats team (Di Coats, Jan Clarke, Sally Clarke, Sharon Mayo) finished 6th in the tough National Womens' Team event.

Carolynne Mucharsky and Kevin Hughes, as part of the Khong team, finished 2nd in the 'Bridge Shop' Novice teams event.

Chris Hasemore, playing with Canberra player Peter Lardy, came 3rd in the TBIB 750/500 Swiss Pairs event.




Three pairs ended up in 5♣ making after opponents went to 4♥.



At the Bridge Table - By Jaan

The premier event at the Summer Festival is the South West Pacific Teams. This is run over 4 days and consists of 12 matches of 20 boards. As you can imagine, it is extremely gruelling and the competition is fierce.



I found two hands from this year's event, which seem particularly interesting.

The popular contract was 4 hearts Deep finesse says this can be made, but the play can be tricky if North gets off to the singleton diamond lead and South returns a D. As far as I could see, the only solution is for West to ruff high, then lead a small club to the ace and return a club to the J, Q and K.

North is then on lead and cannot lead a heart or a club, either of which gives West a free finesse. North therefore has to lead a spade, which is ruffed by West. West can then ruff a small club in dummy with the trump 8, return to hand with another spade ruff, draw trumps

and claim. If a reader can find another solution let us know.

Thirty pairs managed to make 4 hearts or more, while 17 failed. Nine N-S pairs played in 4 spades, with 3 making.

DIr: S Deep finesse says that E-W can make 12 tricks in diamonds, hearts or notrumps. Twenty one declarers made 6H, 3 made 7H, 2 made 7D, 4 made 6D and 2 made 6NT. Thirty four declarers failed in 6H, while one played in 5 clubs, making 7 tricks. A bidding misadventure perhaps? Six diamonds is pretty easy. Without a trump lead, you can arrange to ruff both spade losers, making 13 tricks. With a trump lead you win in dummy with the J, lead the club K discarding one of your spade losers and setting up a club winner for the other losing spade. A 6H contract is trickier. much Suppose North leads

anything but a club. West will get the lead and lead the trump Ace, noting the fall of the Jack from South. If you believe this, then you can finesse North out of the heart T and take all 13 tricks. You still need to take the finesse as a safety play, to ensure 12 tricks. An opening club lead is more difficult. If you ruff this, you will go down, as you will not be able to pick up the trumps for no loser. All of this is highly anti percentage. A normal trump split of 3-2 would provide an easy 13 tricks, but the pessimists would prevail here.

From the Directors Chair - by John McIlrath (Chair, Directing Committee Bridge NSW)

What is a revoke but a failure to follow suit to the card led.

But can we help our partner, either dummy or fellow defender!!!!

Can we correct a revoke? Provided neither you nor your partner has played to the next trick, we can correct. For a defender, the card played becomes a MAJOR penalty card. For the declarer, the card is returned to the hand. If it is too late to correct the revoke, then it has been ESTABLISHED. Play continues and when finished the Director will establish the "Automatic Trick Adjustment" – (Law 64) to be transferred to the non-offending side and assess whether this restores equity on the hand. Please note it is NOT a penalty.

Remember that you can inquire about a possible revoke (Law 61B) as follows: -

- 1. Declarer may ask a defender (ed. Do not suggest this!)
- 2. Dummy may ask declarer, but NOT a defender. Dummy may ask at the END of play.
- 3. Defenders may ask one another and may ask declarer (ed. Do not suggest this!)

N.B. One cannot establish a revoke at trick 12. We just play the cards correctly.



21. MOBILE PHONES, OTHER ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATION DEVICES AND COMPUTERS

- 21.1 Mobile phones (and similar electronic communication devices) must be switched off during session time, i.e. until the scheduled finishing time of the session. If, anywhere within the playing area, a player's mobile phone sounds during session time, or if a player consults a mobile phone during session time, that player's unit shall receive a warning for the first offence and shall be penalised 3 VP (9 IMPs) for each subsequent offence in teams events (including Butler pairs) and 50% of a top in pairs events. (Note that players and playing units are entitled to only one warning per unit.)
- 21.2 Any player, for pressing professional or personal reasons, may request the Director to grant an exemption from the provisions of Paragraph 21.1 of these Regulations. If the request is granted, the Director may make whatever arrangement he/she deems appropriate to allow the player to use the phone. In making such an arrangement, the Director must be cognizant of the amenity of other players.
- 21.3 Before the commencement of each match or stanza, the Director should instruct players to switch off their mobile phones. However, players cannot rely upon such an instruction and failure of the Director to issue it in no way diminishes:
 - (a) A player's obligation to observe all regulations that apply to mobile phones
 - (b) The penalties that apply.
- 21.4 During any session that is broadcast on BBO, no kibitzer or player may consult any type of electronic communication device.
- 21.5 Players reaching the (semi-) finals of all teams events will be required to lodge their mobile phones and other electronic means of communication with the Tournament Staff for safekeeping during each play period.
- 21.6 The Supplementary Regulations may impose additional restrictions and/or penalties on inappropriate use of mobile telephones and other electronic devices.
