keen and quite competitive with partner Carol Long.





At the Bridge Table - By Jaan

This hand was shown in the July newsletter. It comes from a club game a few months ago. Imagine you are sitting West, in a contract of 6NT, and receive the diamond 5 lead. How should you play this to give yourself the best chance of making 12 tricks. Before reading on, try to make a plan (cover the N-S hands).

There are only 9 top tricks – 2 spades, 3 hearts, 1 diamond and 3 clubs. The opening lead has forced out your diamond Ace, so you can't afford a loser in any other suit,



although you can set up another diamond trick by force. You still need to create two more tricks elsewhere.

There are a number of possibilities.

- # If the opposition clubs split 3-3, your long clubs will provide the two tricks needed. (this is about 35%)
- # If the opposition hearts split 3-3, you will gain one trick.
- # If the spade finesse works, you will gain one trick.

How can you best combine there possibilities?

Remember, the goal is 12 tricks. It would be a mistake to take the spade finesse first. If it loses, you will be down at once, without trying the other chances. I think that the best line is as follows. Win trick 1 with the diamond Ace and play the Jack, creating a second diamond winner. Then try the club suit. If the suit splits, as it does here, you have your 12 tricks. If it does not split, then you will need both the heart split and the spade finesse.
