


At the Bridge Table – By Jaan

David and I have been discussing Board 10 which was played for the Christmas Pairs on Monday, across all sections.


I thought it might be an interesting hand to discuss the bidding for the Newsletter. It's a good example of distribution and playing tricks being the clincher rather than the point count.

At our table, the bidding went, 1 club, pass, 1 heart from David, pass, 2 diamonds from me (reverse, showing 16+ and at least 5 clubs/ 4 diamonds). The next bids are the interesting ones (3H & 3NT), and have caused a great deal of discussion in our house! I was supremely lucky to have had the Ace of spades in hand, to win the spade lead. 13 tricks were then off the top.



Response by Jaan

You are sitting in the South seat, and the East dealer passes. If you open 1C, North will respond 1-heart and, again, you have no good bid. On the other hand, if you open 1NT your partner in the North seat, with a good 13 hcp plus a 6-card suit and a singleton, should see the possibility of a small slam and investigate further. North can bid 2D (a transfer to hearts) and over your 2H response can ask for keycards and bid the slam. Thirteen tricks are there in either notrumps, hearts or clubs. Surprisingly, only one pair found the slam (6 clubs). Most declarers were in 4 hearts, making 13 tricks.




At the Bridge Table Continued...

Hand #2

New players are usually advised not to open 1NT with a hand containing two doubletons. This is sound advice for beginners, but experience teaches us that there are definite advantages in relaxing this restriction, if the hand is suitable.

This hand comes from our recent Summer Teams event (match 1, board 7). Suppose you pick up the West hand, and see a pass from South. You have two options.

If you open 1D your partner will respond 1S. You now have no good bid. Your hand is too strong for 1NT and too weak for 2NT. You might bid 2-hearts (a reverse) and the optimum contract of 3NT might still be reached, but probably played by East, with



the strong hand exposed and the unwelcome lead of the club Q. Most experienced players would open the West hand with 1NT, East will bid 3NT, and that will be that. The opponents will have received little information, and the opening lead will come up to the strong hand.

Christmas Tips from our Grand Masters

Christine Hadaway: Accuracy is paramount in bidding.

Sylvia Foster: Don't play to the first trick too quickly; plan how you are going to play the hand when dummy goes down.

Martin Johnson: Bridge is a partnership game.

Hope Tomlinson: I feel that bidding is like having a conversation with your partner, i.e. describe your hand accurately and that gives your partner the opportunity to assess the best contract to be in with the information given.

Robin Vaughan: Look at each player's card as it hits the table.

Ed Vaughan: 'just keep adding up to 13.

Barry Foster: Always keep track of the trumps.

Karen Ody: There are thousands of great tips in our library books.

Shirley Crockett: Christmas is a very special time to spend with family & friends.


